Eriksfjord is the area that Erik the Red chose for his farm when he settled here in 982 AD. This region is also the starting point of the first voyages to North America by his son, Leif Eriksson, 500 years before Columbus. (B,L,D)

Nuuk is the world's smallest capital city with 15,000 inhabitants. Visit the National Museum with its famous 15thcentury Qilakitsoq mummies, found near Uummannaq and the subject of a *National Geographic* cover story. (B,L,D)

Skim past giant lily pads afloat on tannin-rich lakes, and venture deep into the rain forest on narrow tributaries. Spot sloths and monkeys, including variably colored saddleback tamarins, noisy howlers, and shaggy-tailed monk saki monkeys. Watch for an astounding variety of birds, from tanagers and hummingbirds to parrots and endangered scarlet macaws.

Enjoy an opportunity to swim in a lake in the reserve's interior. Seek out *Victoria amazonica*, a giant water lily that grows in small lagoons. Go on a bird-watching hike, listening for the vocal oropendola and then looking for its telltale yellow tail. Listen to a cacophonous symphony of nocturnal animals calling out across the treetops. Then slip through the forest in a skiff as night falls, using a spotlight to find caimans, frogs, fishing bats, and other creatures of the night.

Pay a visit to one of the communities on the reserve's edge and get to know the *ribereños*, those who live on the riverbanks, and their age-old traditions. Enjoy watching them make jewelry and other handicrafts. Learn how local subsistence farmers cultivate wild plants and trees to earn income. Hear about how the locals find edible fruits and indigenous plants with medicinal properties hidden in the jungle. (B,L,D Daily)

OCT. 10-12: U.S./SALVADOR, BRAZIL

Fly overnight to vibrant Salvador, capital of the Bahia region and a hub of Afro-Brazilian culture, and spend a night at the fine Convento do Carmo Hotel, or similar. DAYS 1-3: U.S./BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINA

Fly overnight to Buenos Aires and check into the Caesar Park Hotel (MGallery). Explore the city's Beaux-Arts palaces, the bohemian quarters of La Boca and San Telmo, and the famous balcony forever associated with Eva Peron. Set sail on *National Geographic Explorer.* (Day 3: B,L,D)

DAYS 4-7: AT SEA/BAHÍA BLANCA/AT SEA/ PENINSULA VALDÉS

After a day at sea, explore Bahía Blanca, where we head to a marvelous ranch in the hills outside town for a barbecue lunch, a chance to hike and to view the flora and fauna of the Pampas. Another day of sailing brings us to Peninsula Valdés, a World Heritage site. Southern right whales can famously be seen here close up at this time of year, and we'll venture out for great views. On land, look for guanacos, rheas, armadillos, and more. (B,L,D)

DAYS 8-10: BAHÍA BUSTAMANTE/PUERTO DESEADO/AT SEA

Visit a vast family-owned estancia (ranch) in Bahía Bustamante that stretches from the coast to the Patagonian steppe, where we'll go on hikes, look for marine mammals, and encounter colonies of Magellanic penguins. The next day, travel in small boats into the Reserva Natural Ría Deseado, which is home to the rare black-and-white Commerson's dolphin. Voyaging on the oceanfor the ocean

The ocean is critical to humankind. It gives us more than 100 million tons of seafood per year, helps regulate the climate, and produces half of the oxygen we breathe. But overexploitation, pollution, and climate change threaten ocean health, and ultimately our own. Currently, less than one percent of the ocean is fully protected. While there is an increasing number of conservation organizations dedicated to ocean issues, and more collaboration among these NGOs, the global trajectory of ocean life continues to decline.

The *National Geographic Explorer* and *National Geographic Orion*, our flagship expedition vessels, travel from pole to pole and across the ocean. They are uniquely positioned to support a truly global effort in ocean conservation.

There are few places left in the world that have not been impacted by humans, without fishing and pollution, places that look like the ocean eons ago. These places are key for preserving unique biodiversity and global ocean health, and also serve as a baseline for ocean conservation efforts.

Pristine Seas, a project of the National Geographic Society, explores, surveys, and



helps protect these ocean wildernesses. Since 2005, Pristine Seas has worked with a host of partners around the world to increase the amount of area under protection in the ocean. Marine ecologist and National Geographic Explorerin-Residence Dr. Enric Sala has developed an efficient model that has proven effective, resulting in the creation of some of the largest marine

reserves in the world, with additional marine reserves currently under consideration by the respective government authorities as a result of Pristine Seas expeditions.

Human threats to the ocean are enormous and, despite successes, less than one percent of the ocean is fully protected. Pristine Seas is working towards the international goal of protecting at least 10% of the ocean by 2020. For the next five years, from 2014 through 2018, Lindblad and National Geographic will support this effort by committing to direct at least \$500,000 per year aboard the *National Geographic Explorer* and *National Geographic Orion* to Pristine Seas, to accelerate the creation of marine reserves and safeguard these last wild places in the ocean.

Spend the morning in Manuel Antonio National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage site, where thick forests fringe white-sand beaches. Island agouti and the mantled howler monkey, as well as four varieties of sea turtle. Discover rich marine life while snorkeling, go kayaking or hiking, or relax on the beach. (B,L,D)

DAY 6: GULF OF PANAMA ISLETS/PANAMA CANAL TRANSIT

Today, explore the tiny islets of the Gulf of Panama by expedition landing craft or kayak. Here we might spot frigatebirds, brown pelicans, neotropical cormorants, and brown boobies. Set sail for the Panama Canal this afternoon. Stretching more than 50 miles, the canal was a colossal engineering feat completed in 1914. It is still traversed by some 14,000 ships every year. Stroll through the photogenic French Caribbean village of Bourg, which is decidedly French in character. Return to *Sea Cloud* for a great sail through Guadeloupe Channel. (B,L,D)

Depart on an overnight flight to Athens. After some time at leisure, travel to Piraeus and settle into your cabin on the majestic Sea *Cloud*. Cast off this afternoon, and take in our first Grecian sunset at sea. (D)

DAY 3: AT SEA/SÍFNOS

DAYS 1 AND 2: U.S./ATHENS, GREECE/ PIRAEUS/EMBARK

Depart on an overnight flight to Athens, arriving the next morning. This afternoon, transfer to Piraeus and settle into your cabin aboard the elegant *Sea Cloud*. (D)

DAY 3: AT SEA UNDER SAIL

Round the southern coast of the Peloponnesus peninsula, enjoying a full day of sailing. Watch the crew hoist *Sea Cloud*'s many sails by hand. Relax with a book on deck, photograph our yacht, and attend talks by our expedition team. (B,L,D)



DAY 4: OLYMPIA

Dock in Katákolon and travel to the ancient site of Olympia, birthplace of the Olympic Games. Visit the legendary ruins of this UNESCO World Heritage site, the Olympic Stadium, and the superb Archaeological Museum. (B,L,D)

Cut off from the world for 50 years by its Stalinist dictator, Albania is now feeling its way into the 21st century. Explore the ancient city of Butrint, a UNESCO site, and return to Sarandë for refreshments at Lekuris Castle, looking down on the bay of Sarandë and Corfu. Set sail in the afternoon. (B,L,D)

DAY 7: TIRANA

Dock in Durrës, drive to the ancient capital of Kruje, and visit the medieval market and Ethnographic Museum. Continue to the contemporary capital, Tirana, scattered with the vestiges of one of the longest dictatorships in Eastern Europe. (B,L,D)

DAY 8: PERAST AND KOTOR, MONTENEGRO

Sail into Montenegro via the magnificent Gulf of Kotor. Stop at the historic town of Perast before taking a local boat to the islet of Gospa od Škrpjela, or Our Lady of the Rocks. Steeped in lore, the tiny islet was created by fishermen dropping rocks from their rowboats. Explore medieval Kotor this afternoon, or drive up 25 serpentine switchbacks to the top of the fjord. DAY 9: DUBROVNIK, CROATIA

Known as the "pearl of the Adriatic," Dubrovnik is regarded as one of the best-preserved medieval towns in the world. Spend the day exploring the marvelous old town, a UNESCO World Heritage site, and enjoy a private performance of traditional Croatian *klapa* music. (B,L,D)

DAY 10: SAILING/KORČULA

Anchor at the island port of Korčula, one of the most beautiful medieval towns in the Balkans. Visit the town's sites, and see the house believed by some to be Marco Polo's birthplace. This evening, attend a private traditional *Moreška* sword dance. (B,L,D)

DAY 11: HVAR/SAILING

At the height of Venetian rule, Hvar was the region's most prosperous center. Take a tour inside the delightful walled city. Visit the arsenal and Croatia's oldest active theater, and if you choose, hike up to the dramatically located citadel. (B,L,D)

Depart for Darwin, crossing the international date line, embark *National Geographic Orion*. (D)

Conditions permitting, the quick tide change at Montgomery Reef creates raging torrents of water as the sea level drops and the reef seems to rise from the ocean. Watch from your Zodiac, and look for wildlife feeding on



stranding sea life. Then explore Raft Point with its outdoor Aboriginal drawings—an account of the Wandjinas on the Great Fish Chase. (B,L,D)



DAY 11: TALBOT BAY/HORIZONTAL WATERFALLS

The Horizontal Waterfalls in the Buccaneer Archipelago are created by the rapid tidal fall between ocean side cliffs. When conditions are right, a 'waterfall' ten feet high can form as the trapped waters cascade through the narrow gap. Later, explore the twisted geological folds of the ancient seabed at Cyclone Bay. (B,L,D)

DAY 12: NARES POINT & CROCODILE CREEK

Zodiac cruise and explore off Koolan Island, a finger of sandstone. Nearby Crocodile Creek defies its name, with several vertical embankments keeping it crocodile-free allowing us to take advantage of the cool freshwater natural swimming pool. (B,L,D)

DAYS 1-3: U.S./SINGAPORE/EMBARK

Depart for Singapore, crossing the international date line. Explore Singapore's diverse neighborhoods, then embark *National Geographic Orion*. Hear naturalist talks as we sail the South China Sea. (D)

DAY 4: ANAMBAS ARCHIPELAGO

Snorkel the pristine reefs around Pulau Bawah or Pulau Lintang in the remote Anambas Archipelago. End the day with a beach barbecue. (B,L,D)

DAYS 10 AND 11: TANJUNG PUTING NATIONAL PARK, KALIMANTAN

Set on a peninsula jutting out from the southern edge of Kalimantan, Tanjung Puting National Park is a trove of rare species and diverse habitats. While the park is home to some 220 bird species and numerous monkey species, its most famous residents are the endangered orangutans. Board local boats for a full-day excursion into the forest, gliding on narrow channels on the lookout for hornbills, crocodiles, and perhaps the unusual proboscis monkey.

Our destination is Camp Leakey, a research station established in 1971 by primatologist Dr. Biruté Galdikas, a protégée of paleontologist Louis Leakey and the founder of Orangutan Foundation International (OFI). A many-time National Geographic grantee, Dr. Galdikas will discuss her efforts to save the orangutan from extinction through rehabilitation and habitat preservation. Our boats bring us to feeding stations throughout the forest, where we hope to observe these creatures at close range. The following day, visit the OFI's wildlife rehabilitation center to learn how captive and orphaned orangutans are rescued and rehabilitated. (B,L,D)

DAYS 12 AND 13: AT SEA/DENPASAR, BALI/ DISEMBARK/U.S.

Cross the Java Sea to Bali. Disembark the following morning and transfer to the airport for flights home. (B)

OCT. 18-20: U.S./DENPASAR, BALI, INDONESIA

Depart for Bali, crossing the international date line, and embark National Geographic Orion. (D)

OCT. 21: SUMBAWA, LESSER SUNDA ISLANDS

Sumbawa villagers welcome us with a lively display. See a mock traditional wedding ceremony and a local boxing match. (B,L,D)

OCT. 22: KOMODO

Depart for Australia, crossing the international date line, and embark *National Geographic Orion* upon arrival. (D)

Captain James Cook named these islands the "New Hebrides" because they reminded him of the rugged isles off Scotland's coast. On the main island of Espiritu Santo, snorkel,



swim, and kayak in Paradise Lagoon and then set out for the Blue Hole Grotto, a jewel-blue freshwater source surrounded by jungle. Ride Zodiacs to Lelepa to explore Fels Cave, whose walls are decorated with ancient petroglyphs, and visit Vanuatu's first and only UNESCO World Heritage Site, the final residence and burial site of 17th-century Chief Roi Mata. Snorkel Million Dollar Point, where many tons of military equipment were dumped after the war, or experience one of the best wreck dives in the world: the S.S. *President Coolidge*, a luxury cruise liner used as a troop carrier during World War II. (B,L,D)

NOV. 16: AT SEA (B,L,D)

NOV. 17: BEQA, FIJI

In 1789, Captain William Bligh and 18 loyal crew members sailed past the islands of Fiji following the infamous mutiny aboard the H.M.S. Bounty. Numbering more than 300, the islands are known for their pristine coral reefs and sun-drenched villages steeped in a tranguil tropical atmosphere. Our first stop is the island of Bega (pronounced Mbengga), located just off the southern coast of Viti Levu. Dive or snorkel the surrounding coral reefs, go on walks in the jungle, and paddle sea kayaks along mangrove-lined channels. The island is also the home of the Sawau people, known for their tradition of firewalking. Witness this incredible feat first hand, and learn about the everyday life of the islanders. (B,L,D)

This busy port and capital of North Sumatra offer access to the hinterlands of Sumatra. Choose a full day in the orangutan sanctuary at Bukit Lawang National Park or the highlands near Berastagi for a cultural exchange with the Batak Karo tribespeople. (B,L,D)
