The *Orion* will be equipped with a full roster of exploration tools, including kayaks and a state-of-the-art ROV, plus full snorkeling gear for all, and a SCUBA program that can accommodate up to 24 divers at a time. The staff makeup will resemble the *National Geographic Explorer*, including a National Geographic photographer on all departures. *Orion* is another excellent platform for our immersive expedition style, and you will feel at home.

In Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands, don your snorkel and fins to discover incredible coral reefs and lagoons, revisit World War II history, and get to know vibrant island cultures. Cap off the journey snorkeling or diving Australia's crown jewel: the Great Barrier Reef.

MAR. 19-21: U.S./AUCKLAND, NEW ZEALAND/EMBARK

Depart for Auckland, cross the International Date Line, and relax in your hotel day room before embarking our ship. (D)

MAR. 22: BAY OF ISLANDS

Go ashore via Zodiac to Russell, rich in Maori history. See the carved Maori meeting house and ceremonial war canoes. (B,L,D)

MAR. 23-24: AT SEA/NORFOLK ISLAND, AUSTRALIA

A day at sea takes us to Norfolk Island, a UNESCO site and former British penal colony. Explore the ruins, swim, or hike. (B,L,D)

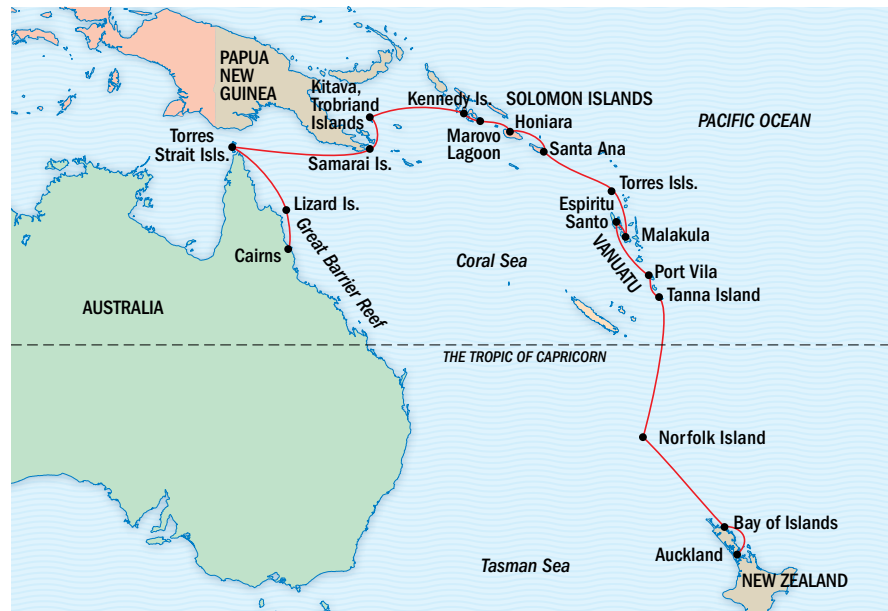
MAR. 25-30: AT SEA/VANUATU

A day at sea brings us to Vanuatu, an archipelago of more than 80 islands that was once home to fierce warriors, among them cannibals. On Tanna Island we hike to the rim of Mt. Yasur, an active volcano with an eerie red glow at its cone. Wander the sleepy capital of Vanuatu, Port Vila. Explore the massive Fels Cave, with its thousand-year-old petroglyphs. Land at ancient ceremonial grounds on Malakula and see an elaborate spirit dance.

Swim, snorkel and kayak at Paradise Lagoon on Espiritu Santo. See the remnants of WWII on the island of Luganville, and snorkel Million Dollar Point, where hundreds of tons of U.S. military equipment were dumped after the war; divers may descend on the troop carrier *Calvin Coolidge*—one of the world's best wreck dives. Spend a day exploring the northernmost group of islands in Vanuatu, remote and seldom visited. The South Pacific is an ever-flowing feast for the senses! (B,L,D)

MAR. 31-APR. 3: SOLOMON ISLANDS

Settled as early as 25,000 BC by skull-worshipping tribes, today the friendly Solomons remain some of the least-visited, most dive-worthy South Pacific



islands. Villagers on Santa Ana perform a stunning dance with spears and mud-covered face masks. This region was a strategic WWII battleground and we visit Honiara, a former U.S. supply depot, and Kennedy Island, named after President John F. Kennedy who swam ashore here after the Japanese sank his PT-109 patrol boat. We meet the wood carvers of Marovo, reported to be the best in the Pacific, and explore isolated Marovo Lagoon, a proposed UNESCO site and an exceptional spot for swimming, snorkeling, kayaking, and diving. (B,L,D)

APR. 4-6: PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Papua New Guinea is a patchwork of mountains and jungle, home to some 700 Papuan and Melanesian tribes, each with its own language. On Kitava in the Trobriands hundreds of villagers gather to celebrate with great festivities, dancing, singing and chanting. Photographers will vie to capture the many beautiful faces. Samarai will be a new call for Lindblad; it's an island with a fascinating history of colonialism, missionaries and headhunters. Throughout we'll swim, snorkel, and beachcomb amid idyllic tropical scenery. (B,L,D)

APR. 7-8: AT SEA/THURSDAY ISLAND & TORRES STRAIT, AUSTRALIA

Enter the Great Barrier Reef, one of the natural wonders of the world. Snorkel and dive the reef, starting in the Torres Strait, stopping at Thursday Island, formerly a hub of the pearl industry. (B,L,D)

APR. 9-10 LIZARD ISLAND, THE GREAT BARRIER REEF

Spend a day snorkeling or diving among forests of corals that encircle Lizard Island National Park. Wander on white-sand beaches, learn about the islands' significance to the Dingaal people, and hike up to "Cook's Look," where Captain Cook plotted his route through the reefs. Then sail to a remote section of the reef and discover a thrilling array of marine life. (B,L,D)

APR. 11-12: CAIRNS/DISEMBARK/ OVERNIGHT HOTEL/U.S.

Disembark in Cairns located in far northwestern Queensland. Explore its vibrant tropical setting and spend the night at a lovely seaside hotel before flights home. (B)

Immerse yourself in some of the most pristine marine habitats on the planet on a voyage aboard the new *National Geographic Orion*. Encounter the vestiges of World War II battles in Papua New Guinea and Micronesia, and get acquainted with the rich and diverse cultures of the South Pacific.

APR. 9-11: U.S./CAIRNS, AUSTRALIA/ EMBARK

Depart for Cairns, cross the International Date Line, and board *National Geographic Orion* on arrival. (D)

APR. 12-13: LIZARD ISLAND, THE GREAT BARRIER REEF

Spend a day snorkeling or diving among forests of corals that encircle Lizard Island National Park. Wander on white-sand beaches, learn about the islands' significance to their native Dingaál people, and hike up to "Cook's Look," where Captain Cook plotted his route through the reefs. Then sail to a remote section of the reef and discover a thrilling array of marine life. (B,L,D)

APR. 14: THURSDAY ISLAND AND TORRES STRAIT

Land at Cape York on the northern tip of Queensland, or go for a snorkel or dive on the Great Barrier Reef. Then head into the Torres Strait, stopping at Thursday Island, formerly a hub of the pearl industry. (B,L,D)

APR. 15-19: PAPUA NEW GUINEA

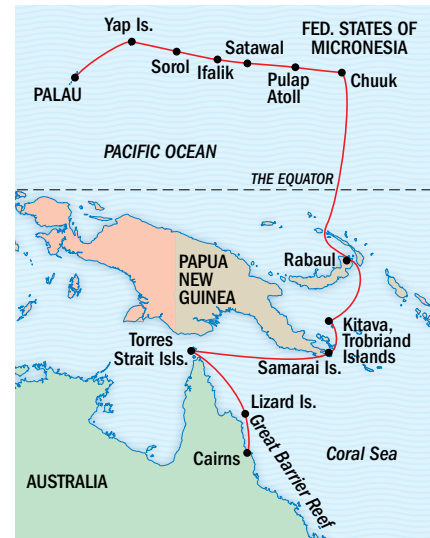
After a day at sea, arrive on Samarai, once an important trading post. Explore a turbulent history of colonists, missionaries, headhunters, and world wars; or swim and snorkel on neighboring islands. In the Trobriand Islands, witness an incredible performance by traditional dancers festooned with flowers, feathers, and face-paint. A morning at sea then brings us to Rabaul, a former provincial capital that was blanketed in ash in 1994 by the volcano that rises above it. Visit the old town and the Japanese fortifications from World War II. At night, watch the unique fire dancers of the Baining tribe. The next day, explore New Ireland and the tiny island groups scattered off its shores. (B,L,D)

APR. 20-23: AT SEA/CHUUK STATE, FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA (FSM)

We set our sights north, and sail to Micronesia, crossing the equator along the way. Amid the jungles and idyllic beaches of the Chuuk atoll lie hundreds of artifacts from World War II, from torpedoes and planes to cave networks. We'll take two days to explore the islands of Chuuk, Pulap, and Tamatam. Snorkel or dive among Chuuk's renowned WWII shipwrecks now blooming with corals. Spot wildlife on rain forest walks; watch woodcarvers and weavers at work; and spend time getting acquainted with the everyday traditions of the islands, largely unchanged over the centuries. (B,L,D)

APR. 24-27: YAP STATE, FSM

Sail to Satawal, where village women in lava-lava skirts greet us with a traditional welcome dance. Snorkel the reef or explore the breadfruit forests from which islanders make their outrigger canoes. On Ifalik, where a number of modern amenities are banned, we'll visit by permission of the chief. Snorkel, dive, birdwatch, and beachcomb on the island of Sorol. Yap Island is known for the large, carved stone disks that were once the island's tender and are still used in



ceremonial exchanges. See a *wunbey*, a stone platform where the elders hold meetings, and snorkel or dive among majestic manta rays. (B,L,D)

APR. 28: PALAU

Our last landfall is the tropical paradise of Palau. At legendary Jellyfish Lake, enjoy an otherworldly snorkeling experience among stingless jellyfish. (B,L,D)

APR. 29-30: PALAU/DISEMBARK/U.S.

Disembark and check into day rooms at our hotel. Explore on your own, perhaps going for a final swim, before a late evening overnight flight home. (B)

VOYAGE TO THE SPICE ISLANDS & THE CORAL TRIANGLE

17 DAYS/14 NIGHTS—ABOARD *NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC ORION*

DEPARTURE: April 27, 2014

Scattered across the tropical seas like gems, the islands of eastern Indonesia are fringed with white-sand beaches, karst pinnacles, and some of the most pristine coral reef systems in the world. Sail south from Palau to the Moluccas archipelago—once known as the Spice Islands—aboard the new *National Geographic Orion*. Witness the world's richest marine biodiversity in Raja Ampat, discover the legacy of the Dutch East India Company in the Banda Islands, and experience island cultures from West Papua to Timor.

EXPEDITION HIGHLIGHTS

- ▶ Glide a Zodiac among the emerald-tufted Rock Islands of Palau, a UNESCO World Heritage site, and kayak beneath the stunning karst formations of Bird's Head Peninsula.
- ▶ Immerse yourself in a dazzling world of coral and tropical fish while snorkeling or diving Raja Ampat, whose rich marine biodiversity is unparalleled.
- ▶ Examine ancient rock art and encounter a fascinating patchwork of cultures on these remote islands.
- ▶ Explore the turbulent history of the spice trade in the Dutch East Indies, and see vestiges of World War II.

APR. 27-29: U.S./KOROR, PALAU/ EMBARK

Depart for Palau, cross the International Date Line, and check into our hotel upon arrival. On our first full day, go snorkeling among floating gardens; walk to Jellyfish Lake and swim with these ethereal, stingless creatures; or tour the island's World War II sites. We board *National Geographic Orion* this afternoon. (D)

APR. 30: PALAU'S ROCK ISLANDS

Spend today in the Rock Islands Southern Lagoon, a UNESCO World Heritage site where hundreds of mushroom-shaped limestone islets form emerald chains in the blue seas. Explore this exquisite area by Zodiac; discover empty, white-sand beaches; and go snorkeling or diving among forests of colorful coral. (B,L,D)

MAY 1-4: AT SEA/RAJA AMPAT, INDONESIA

Sail south towards Raja Ampat, an archipelago located in the Coral Triangle that has been found to have the richest coral reef biodiversity for its size in the world. Above sea level the experiences are just as amazing, with lush islands, towering limestone pinnacles and white-sand beaches. Spend three days exploring this natural wonderland, gliding in Zodiacs and kayaks around the sandy coves of these lush karst islands, and snorkeling or diving among groves of colorful coral fans. Step ashore to a big Papuan welcome, visit the school, see cooking displays, and learn about the local culture. On a birding walk, spot red birds of paradise, sulphur-crested cockatoos, beach kingfishers, varied honeyeaters, and much more. (B,L,D)

MAY 5: KOKAS AND ARGUNI, FAKFAK, INDONESIA

Use Zodiacs to get up close to 20,000-year-old rock art near the

fishing village of Kokas. Venture into skull-filled caves, and see the remains of the underground Japanese bunker built here during World War II. Witness a traditional dance and learn about the myriad cultures that have passed through this region. (B,L,D)

MAY 6-9: EXPLORING THE MOLUCCA ISLANDS

Sail into the Molucca archipelago, also known as Maluku or the Spice Islands. In the heart of the Moluccas, lay the Banda Islands, where a *kora kora*, or traditional war canoe, escorts us to the enchanted isle of Bandanaira, a hub of the Dutch East India Company and a major source of nutmeg and mace. Stroll past Dutch architecture and visit Fort Belgica, and later, swim or snorkel beneath the volcano of Banda Api. Visit the island of Run, which played an integral role in the spice wars between the British and the Dutch. In the village of Sangliat Dol in the Tanimbar Islands, witness a unique ceremony at a symbolic ancient stone boat, and visit with villagers in their homes. Our last stop in the Moluccas is Kisar, where we encounter Dutch colonial ruins, see weavers at work, and enjoy a traditional dance performance. (B,L,D)

MAY 10: JACO, EAST TIMOR

The island of Jaco, considered sacred



by the Timorese, is part of Nino Konis Santana National Park. Discover the island's sparkling white-sand beaches, go birding or swimming or snorkeling, and cap off the day with a beach barbecue. (B,L,D)

MAY 11-13: AT SEA/DARWIN, AUSTRALIA/U.S.

After a final day at sea, disembark in Darwin, capital of the Northern Territory. Relax in day rooms at our hotel, or explore this multicultural city, perhaps seeing Aboriginal art at the galleries, before a late evening overnight flight home. (B,L,D;B)

National Geographic Orion

National Geographic Orion is a state-of-the-art, fully stabilized expedition ship and the newest addition to the Lindblad/National Geographic fleet.

CAPACITY: 102 guests in 53 outside cabins.

REGISTRY: Bahamas. **OVERALL LENGTH:** 338 feet.

PUBLIC AREAS: Outdoor café and bar, lounge & cocktail bar perfect for briefings and entertainment, restaurant, sun deck, 24 hour reception desk, state-of-the-art lecture theater, library, marina platform, mud room with lockers for expedition gear, and a centrally located elevator. Guests are welcome on the “open bridge” to meet the captain and officers and learn about navigation.

MEALS: Served in a single seating with unassigned tables. Exceptional cuisine features tastes of the regions we visit along and special signature menus designed by Sydney’s Serge Danserau of the ‘The Bathers’ pavilion.

CABINS: All cabins offer ocean views with windows, private facilities, and climate controls. Some cabins have balconies. Cabins offer

internet access, a flat screen TV and DVD/CD player. Single cabins in Category 1 and Category 3 include cabins #301, 322, 323 and 512 and are highlighted in bright pink or bright blue.

EXPEDITION EQUIPMENT: Zodiac landing craft, kayaks, snorkeling gear, dive gear, bow camera, Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV), hydrophone, underwater video cameras, video microscope, video chronicle, and marina platform.

SPECIAL FEATURES: A full-time doctor and medical center, video chronicler, undersea specialist, LEX-NG certified photo instructor, National Geographic photographer, global market, and internet access available in all staterooms using your own laptop.

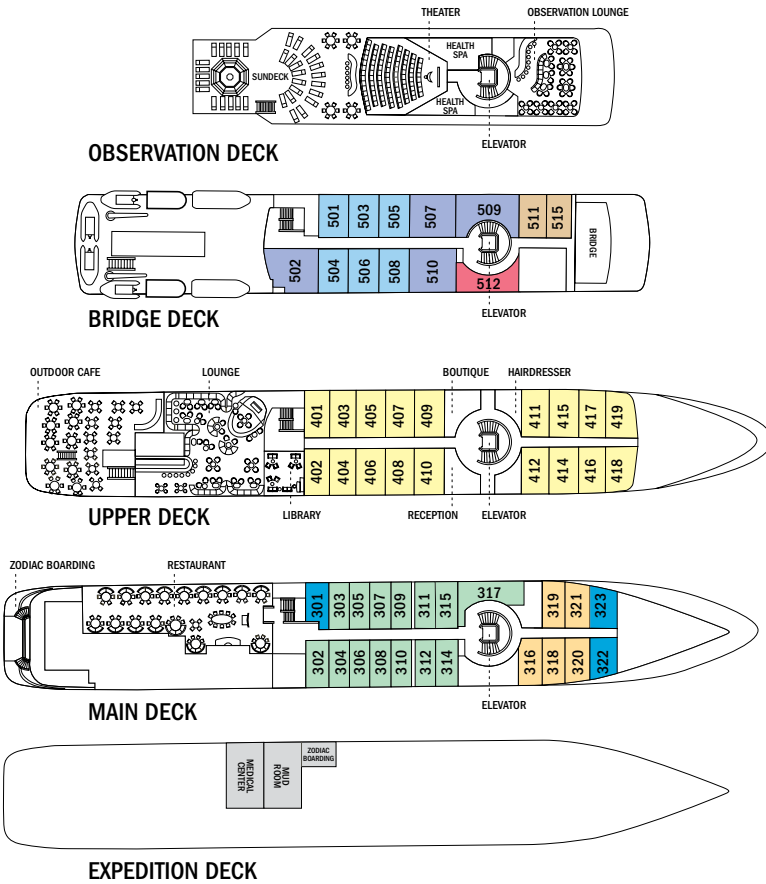

Note: There will be a small surcharge for scuba diving, which will include equipment and the guidance of a certified divemaster.

Airfare: For all programs, airfare is an additional cost unless otherwise indicated. Sample airfares subject to change. We will gladly assist in making your air arrangements for a \$50 per person service fee.

TERMS & CONDITIONS

Reservations: To reserve your place, an advance payment in the amount of \$2,000 per person is required at the time of reservation. Certain longer voyages may carry additional advance deposit requirements due to high demand for these voyages. Payment is accepted by Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover, or by check.

Receipt of your initial payment indicates your acceptance of our complete Terms and Conditions. We require written notice at the time of reservation for any physical condition, diet, or treatment requiring special attention.

Once your reservation is confirmed, we urge you to use your personalized online account for important information to help you prepare for your voyage. Managing your documents online will facilitate fast and accurate communication, and allow you to provide us with pertinent details we require, in order to complete your reservation. Your online account gives you access to your Expedition Guide, which includes valuable information specific to your voyage. You can also use your online account to make easy payments, view recommended flights and reading material, packing list, and so much more.

Final Payment: Final payment is due 120 days prior to departure. Payment schedules may vary for certain longer voyages, due to high demand for these voyages. We reserve the right to cancel your reservation if payment has not been received by final payment due date.

Travel Protection Plan: We strongly recommend that you take advantage of our Travel Protection Plan. This plan offers comprehensive coverage to protect you from cancellation fees, costs incurred due to trip delays/interruption, damaged or lost baggage, medical assistance and evacuation during your travels.
