






Expedition leader, naturalist & certified photo instructor

Naturalist, certified photo instructor & undersea specialist Aura's grandparents were among the earliest settlers in the Galápagos in the 1930s—her mother was born on Floreana Island, one of twelve siblings intricately involved in

the conservation of the islands. Aura's childhood was spent among the finches and swimming with sea lions. After completing studies in Quito, Aura returned and has spent the past ten years sharing Galápagos and photography with guests.

Juan Carlos spent his early years in the natural exuberance of the Cotopaxi region of Ecuador. At the age of twelve, his family moved to Santa Cruz, Galápagos. His knowledge of the natural history of the islands is bone deep. Currently completing his education degree, he is an advocate for the importance of the archipelago and its conservation. In his role as a Lindblad-National Geographic certified photo instructor, he helps guests "see" the islands in every sense.

Jonathan's family dates back five generations on San Cristóbal Island, Galápagos. He first left the islands on a scholarship to finish his bachelor's degree in integrative biology in

WHEN YOU TRAVEL WITH US, YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Together with our guests, we've contributed \$6.8 million to important conservation, education, research, and community development projects in Galápagos, creating the Lindblad Expeditions-National Geographic (LEX-NG) Fund to manage donations. Since the LEX-NG Fund carries the operating costs, 100% of guest donations stay in the region and are put toward the highest conservation priorities—determined by the Fund's Board and advised by science and conservation leaders who know the region. Foundations including the Helmsley Charitable Trust have joined these efforts, providing significant grants to tackle the biggest challenges facing the archipelago. Here are some examples of the projects we support—and news on our Conservation In Action initiative.

+ Among travel companies, only Lindblad Expeditions can trace their roots for contributing to vital conservation efforts back to the establishment of the Galápagos National Park, nearly 50 years ago.

NEW: CONSERVATION IN ACTION

Last summer we inaugurated the first of an anticipated annual event: Conservation In Action. Sven Lindblad offered to donate \$1,000 per person towards local conservation for joining us on a Galápagos expedition from August 15 to September 26, 2015—to experience the islands, while participating in conservation firsthand. Guests who accepted the offer met and trained with our Paper To Pearls team aboard ship. Enthusiastic volunteers re-purposed clean waste paper (magazines, advertising, and more) to make beautiful, eco-smart "pearls." Their efforts yielded a generous supply of brightly-hued paper pearls, which were then donated to Galápagos jewelry artisans, in conjunction with the LEX-NG Artisan Fund. (See story at right) More initiatives are being planned for next year; stay tuned for upcoming details.





A+ IN GALÁPAGOS STUDIES

The Tomás de Berlanga School, in the Santa Cruz highlands, is a private, open-air school that immerses its students in nature. Its curriculum seeks to cultivate the next generation of leaders for Galápagos through critical thinking, bilingualism, high academic standards, and experiential learning. Guests traveling with us aboard *National Geographic Endeavour* have the opportunity to visit the openair classrooms, watch children learning in nature, and see the benefits of this program firsthand when classes are in session.

TRASH INTO TREASURE

The LEX-NG Artisan Fund is addressing two simultaneous problems: artisans' need for materials, and Galápagos' challenges in dealing with waste. The Glass Adaptive Reuse project trains artisans and students in the use of glass machinery and tools for carving, etching, and sanding, and provides them with inexpensive and readily available materials for their work. Three years after the program's inception, 40% of the galleries and shops in Santa Cruz offer recycled glass objects. Restaurants and hotels are using recycled glass for tableware. Artisans trained in the program have won conservation in art awards regionally and nationally. And two of the artisans have been so successful, they're building their own glass studios to employ others to expand their recycled offerings.

DAY 1: U.S./GUAYAQUIL, ECUADOR Depart for Guayaquil and upon arrival, transfer to the Hotel Hilton Colón.

DAY 2: GUAYAQUIL/GALÁPAGOS

This morning, fly to the Galápagos Islands and board *National Geographic Endeavour* or *National Geographic Islander*. After lunch, we begin our exploration of the islands and their diverse wildlife. (B,L,D)

DAYS 3-8: EXPLORING THE GALÁPAGOS

Listed below is a sample of the islands we may visit during our expedition.* (B,L,D Daily)

ISLA BARTOLOMÉ

Walk to the top of Bartolomé's volcanic cone for a stunning view of Pinnacle Rock and the surrounding golden sand beaches. After the hike, immerse yourself among schools of multicolored reef fish. You may also have the opportunity to swim with Galápagos penguins.

ISLA SANTIAGO

Follow a path along a series of tide pools and underwater caverns in search of Galápagos fur seals, marine iguanas, sea lions, shore birds and Sally Lightfoot crabs.

ISLA SANTA CRUZ

Santa Cruz is home to the Charles Darwin Research station; learn about the science done here and visit the neighboring captive breeding program for endangered species of Galápagos giant tortoises, by their partners in conservation, the Galápagos National Park Service. Later, travel into the highlands where wild tortoises forage, to observe and photograph these tortoises in the wild.

ISLA ISABELA

Explore the largest island in the group, home to enormous marine iguanas, abundant sea turtles, the only species of flightless cormorant in the world, and the only penguin species that inhabits the equator. Cruise by Zodiac and hike against the backdrop of giant shield volcanoes, and snorkel in the cool, rich waters that often draw whales and dolphins to the area.

ISLA FLOREANA

At Champion Islet, snorkel among sea lions, or peer into an underwater world in a

glass-bottom boat while keeping an eye out for the endangered Floreana mockingbird. Those interested can visit Post Office Bay, founded by whalers in the 18th century—if you see a letter addressed to someone who lives near you, the tradition is to deliver it by hand.



ISLA FERNANDINA

Discover the marine iguana haven of Punta Espinoza as we hike over lava flows. Galápagos hawks, sea lion nurseries and the rare Galápagos flightless cormorant will be found as we explore this island.

ISLA ESPAÑOLA

See swallow-tailed gulls, Española mockingbirds, boobies, and, seasonally, waved albatross on this birder's paradise. Walk among vivid green and red marine iguanas and unique lava lizards, and observe sea lions up close on a pristine white-sand beach.

DAY 9: GALÁPAGOS/GUAYAQUIL After breakfast, disembark the ship and fly to Guayaguil. The evening is at your leisure at the

Guayaquil. The evening is at your leisure at the Hotel Hilton Colón. (B)

DAY 10: GUAYAQUIL/U.S.

Depart Guayaquil this morning, arriving home the same day. (B)

DAY 9: GALÁPAGOS/GUAYAQUIL/ LIMA, PERU

Depart Galápagos this morning and fly to Lima, Peru via Guayaquil, arriving in the evening. Overnight at the comfortable and conveniently located Wyndham Costa del Sol Lima Airport Hotel. (B,L)

DAY 10: LIMA/CUSCO/SACRED VALLEY OF THE INCA

This morning fly from Lima to Cusco and drive to Awanacancha where llamas, alpacas, vicuñas, and guanacos are bred. Enjoy an afternoon lecture by Peter Frost. Check into the Sol y Luna Hotel. (B,L,D)

DAY 11: SACRED VALLEY OF THE INCA

Visit the massive Inca fortress of
Ollantaytambo. Then attend a traditional
weaving demonstration by National
Geographic grantee Nilda Callañaupa.
Enjoy an outdoor lunch with a Paso horse
demonstration. Visit to a local pottery studio,
featuring ceramics made with ancient
Peruvian techniques and designs. After dinner,
enjoy a folkloric dance performance. (B,L,D)

DAY 12: SACRED VALLEY/MACHU PICCHU

Continue from the valley to Machu Picchu for a guided visit. Overnight at the historic

31-room Belmond Sanctuary Lodge (formerly the Orient-Express Sanctuary Lodge). The lodge's grounds are home to a great variety of the religion's colorful flowers and birds. (B,L,D)

DAY 13: MACHU PICCHU/CUSCO
Early morning, hike to the Sun Gate, the
ancient final checkpoint to Machu Picchu,
and watch daybreak over the sacred ruins.
The morning is free to explore. After a train
and bus ride we arrive in Cusco in the late
afternoon for two nights at the Belmond
Monasterio Hotel (formerly the Orient-Express
Monasterio Hotel). (B,L,D)

DAY 14: CUSCO



DAY 9: GALÁPAGOS/GUAYAQUIL/LIMA, PERU

Depart Galápagos this morning and fly to Lima, Peru via Guayaquil, arriving in the evening. Overnight at the conveniently located Wyndham Costa del Sol Lima Airport Hotel. (B,L)

DAY 10: LIMA/IQUITOS/NAUTA

Enjoy a morning tour of Lima, then fly to Iquitos and continue overland to the riverside village of Nauta, where the *Delfin II* awaits. Settle into your cabin, and gather for a welcome dinner of fine Peruvian cuisine on board. Tonight, step out on deck to gaze at the magnificent Amazon night sky. (B,L,D)

DAYS 11-18: PACAYA-SAMIRIA NATIONAL RESERVE

Spend this week exploring the Pacaya-Samiria National Reserve, a pristine swath of jungle—one of the largest in South America—stretching more than five million acres, and harboring some of the Amazon's most fascinating flora and fauna. Bordered by the Marañón and the Ucayali, two powerful rivers that converge to create the famed Amazon, the reserve floods annually with nutrient-rich waters and is known locally as the Mirrored Forest for the reflections created by the glassy water.

Set out into this remarkable wilderness on daily excursions by skiff, kayak, and, when

the water level permits, hikes on terra firma. Skim past giant lily pads afloat on black-water lakes, and venture deep into the rain forest on narrow tributaries. Spot sloths and monkeys, including variably colored saddleback tamarins, noisy and shaggy-tailed monk saki monkeys. Watch for an astounding variety of birds, from tanagers and hummingbirds to parrots and endangered scarlet macaws. In the river, look for massive *paiche* fish, the Amazon's largest; rare pink dolphins; and the infamous piranhas.



Enjoy an opportunity to swim in a lake in the reserve's interior. Seek out *Victoria amazonica*, a giant water lily that grows in small lagoons. Go on a bird-watching hike, listening for the vocal oropendola and then looking for its telltale yellow tail. Watch the sun set and listen to a cacophonous symphony of nocturnal animals calling out across the treetops. Then

slip through the forest in a skiff as night falls, using a spotlight to find caimans, frogs, fishing bats and other creatures of the night.

Pay a visit to one of the communities on the reserve's edge and get to know the *ribereños*, those who live on the riverbanks, and their age-old traditions. Meet local women and children, and watch them make jewelry and other handicrafts. Learn how local subsistence farmers cultivate wild plants and trees to earn income. Hear about how local residents find edible fruits and indigenous plants with medicinal properties hidden in the jungle. (B,L,D Daily)

DAY 19: NAUTA/IQUITOS/LIMA

Enjoy one last morning excursion by skiff to view wildlife. After lunch, disembark in Nauta, and return to lquitos overland for a lateafternoon flight to Lima. Wyndham Costa del Sol Lima Airport Hotel. (B,L)

DAY 20: LIMA/U.S.

After breakfast, transfer to the airport for your flight home. (B)
