

Few know how dazzling and colorful the undersea is, especially in cold waters like those found in Alaska. The wealth of biodiversity is astonishing and truly worthy of protection which is why I'm also very proud to announce that our fleet is now 100 percent free of all singleuse plastic bottles, cups, straws, and stirrers. Our connections with welcoming locals and First Nations communities we visit in Alaska and British Columbia create moving and memorable encounters to take away.

THE ONLY WAY TO TRAVEL WITH THE DIRECTOR OF THE ALASKA WHALE FOUNDATION



The whale-watching experience we provide in Alaska is genuinely extraordinary because of our staff and expert guests like **Andy Szabo, the director of the Alaska Whale Foundation.** The AWF is our Southeast regional conservation partner and a longtime grantee of the LEX-NG Fund. Thanks to our exclusive alliance, he regularly comes aboard our ships to discuss his latest findings, observe whales on deck with guests, and illuminate the fascinating cultural behaviors of the humpback population in this region. Andy recently took time to share some of his best whale wisdom with us—read on for a taste of what it's like to travel alongside him.

What makes Southeast Alaska's humpbacks so intriguing?

Anything a humpback has ever been observed doing, has also been observed doing here in Alaska—but there are also a number of things they've been observed doing here that they've never been seen doing anywhere else on Earth, including cooperative bubble-net feeding. And within the population of about 4000-6000 humpbacks here in SE Alaska we have only identified 50 or 60 whales that routinely engage in this fascinating coordinated behavior. These working groups, which we've been observing for over 25 years, stay together for decades and have learned to divvy up their roles—you have your bubble blowers and your vocalizers, and the one who corrals the fish. So, it is a pretty remarkable population, and of course everything is set against this incredible backdrop of Alaska's rain forest, glaciers, and mountains.



"It's not always clear just how special these encounters are that you're having. I can come along and point to a specific individual and say 'that's Melancholy and she's had this many calves', or 'that whale there is 70 years old, the leader of this group and one of the most remarkable individuals anyone has ever observed in the wild.' Once people start to hear those kinds of things it really changes the whole experience."



You definitely add a unique and engaging layer to our guest experience! Can you also talk a little bit about how we've been able to help your efforts in return?

Absolutely. We've asked your captains and staff to help deliver realtime information on the whereabouts of specific animals we're looking for. And since Lindblad vessels travel a lot further than we can, they can also give us information from areas we aren't able to frequent. On the flip side we're compiling all this data so on any given day when your expedition leaders know they're going to be in an area where we're working they can contact us and we can steer them in the direction of where we've been encountering either large numbers of whales in general or more often these specific groups of bubblenetting whales which everyone wants to see. So, we've developed a really nice back-and-forth relationship.

Is there a time of year you love being in Alaska the most?

People ask me that all the time and bar none, I'd have to say, it's May. First of all, the weather is spectacular—you have the most days of sun, spring comes out in full force so hiking around the forest the birds are all singing, and everything is verdant and lush. You also find humpback whales doing some of the more interesting behaviors we've been observing of late including depredating. They exploit juvenile salmon being released from hatcheries in the area which means you frequently find solitary whales just moving up and down literally feet from the shore bubble-netting alone on salmon in four feet of water. It's something I'd never seen 10 years ago, a new behavior, and it's pretty cool to watch!

August is also a wonderful time to predictably see large numbers of whales, and of course you have bears grabbing salmon right out of the water and many other iconic wildlife moments that tend to happen later in the season.



This is Viking Petal, my favorite whale who I've seen for over 18 years. He has this way of appearing at the right place at the right time—we can go an entire year and just happen to be cruising through Frederick Sound and he pops up. Here, we photo ID'd him using the fluke prints on the underside of his tail—they are like 15-foot-high billboards advertising each whale's identity.

When we learned that stock levels of king salmon were low we immediately removed it from the menu and reinstated Pacific yellow rockfish which are once again thriving. Throughout the journey you'll savor a phenomenal selection fished from the very waters you're exploring: wild-caught Alaskan sockeye and coho (silver) salmon, halibut, black cod, and of course Dungeness crab, a crowd favorite that's paired with freshly baked cheddar chive biscuits, corn on the cob, and tricolor fingerling potatoes.

In turn, all our ships—*National Geographic Sea Bird, Sea Lion, Quest, and Venture* are equally equipped with a roster of exploration tools. A fleet of expedition landing craft on each allows us to explore, and land, in pristine wild places where no infrastructure of docks and ports exist. A fleet of kayaks and paddleboards enable you to get out on personal adventures. In addition, ours are the only ships in Alaska with an undersea specialist and undersea video technology aboard—to provide video presentations of the world beneath the ship for all to enjoy in brilliant HD from the comfort of the ship's lounge. *Quest and Venture* are equipped with an ROV (Remotely Operated Vehicle) capable of exploring depths of up to 1,000 feet. Other advantages of our ships include: spacious decks ideal for freshair wildlife-watching with your naturalists; and generous windows that bring in the jaw-dropping scenery—to keep you constantly connected everywhere on board to the iconic Alaska you came to experience.

EXPEDITION HIGHLIGHTS

NEW

- Cross the iconic Bering Strait and the length of the Bering Sea.
- In the Pribilof Islands, witness the largest breeding rookery of northern fur seals, comprising about half the world's fur seal population.
- Spot rafts of sea otters in the Baby Islands.
- Walk among a forest of petrified sequoia stumps scattered along the shores of Unga Island.
- Observe brown bears digging for clams or fishing for salmon in Katmai National Park.

DAY 1: ANCHORAGE, ALASKA, U.S./ NOME/EMBARK

Arrive in Anchorage and fly to Nome, Alaska. Embark *National Geographic Orion*. (D)

DAY 2: AT SEA/CROSSING THE BERING STRAIT

Spend the first day at sea crossing one of the most iconic bodies of water on the planet. If conditions and timing permit, we may stop at the very remote Little Diomede Island, in the center of the Strait. (B,L,D)

DAY 3: PROVIDENIYA, RUSSIAN FEDERATION

At the western limit of the rich transboundary area known as Beringia, Provideniya is often called "The Gateway to the Arctic". It's also the administrative center where we will conduct our clearance in Russia. Visit the excellent museum, and witness a traditional Yupik dance performance. (B,L,D)

DAYS 4–6: AT SEA/PRIBILOF ISLANDS, U.S.

A naturalist's paradise, the Pribilof Islands welcome three million seabirds and a million marine mammals each summer as they arrive to breed. Go ashore at St. Paul to explore on land, at St. George go by Zodiac to view puffins, kittiwakes and red-faced cormorants, as well as a northern fur seal rookery. (B,L,D Daily)

DAYS 7 & 8: UNALASKA/ALASKA PENINSULA

This morning, arrive at Dutch Harbor, site of a fierce WWII battle and now one of the world's

most important fishing ports. Continue to the Baby Islands, just east of Unalaska, where dynamic tides offer exciting potential to spot sea otters and fur seals, as well as rare seabirds, both from the ship's deck and from Zodiacs. Continue along the eastern shore of the Alaska Peninsula, with time for exploration and wildlife watching. (B,L,D Daily)



DAY 9: SHUMAGIN ISLANDS

Go ashore on Unga Island to explore incredible tundra and scattered remnants of a unique petrified forest of sequoia trees that were buried in a volcanic mudslide nearly 25 million years ago. (B,L,D)

DAY 10: KATMAI NATIONAL PARK

Spend today exploring the shorelines and waters of coastal Katmai National Park & Preserve, known for its abundant brown bear population, this area provides countless opportunities to watch and photograph bears digging for clams at low tide, or fishing for salmon in the creeks. (B,L,D)





DAY 11: KODIAK ISLAND

The second largest island in the U.S., Kodiak is best known for its brown bears and its fishing industry. Less well known is its unique mix of Native Alutiiq and Russian-American history. Join your Undersea Specialist for a "dock walk" among the commercial fishing boats in Kodiak's inner harbor. DAY 1: JUNEAU/EMBARK

Explore the newly constructed Alaska State Museum, with its sprawling collection of natural history and cultural artifacts, and explore downtown Juneau. Settle into your cabin before dinner. Later, explore the port of Juneau on your own. (D)

DAY 2: TRACY ARM—FORDS TERROR WILDERNESS

Voyage into Tracy or Endicott Arm, both spectacular fjords, with waterfalls cascading from glacially carved walls.
