And our fleet of expedition landing craft, plus our special access permits, allow us to land along the wild shores, and venture into communities that have remained deliberately roadless.



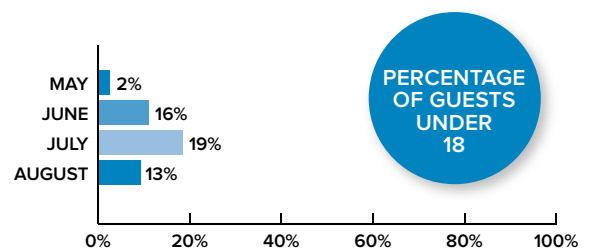
The vast number of visitors to Alaska come from June through mid-August. It's very much a family destination, and these mid-summer expeditions aboard our ships are alive with families, often three generations, and the pitter-patter of enthusiastic kids running up and down the decks is either a joyful sound, or not depending on your perspective. In May, the population joining us is, largely, adults only. So, if you are more inclined to be with other grownups not engaged with their children, this is a far better time to go.

I occasionally run into people who ask if May is too early and the answer is absolutely not. In spring, there's a wonderful sense of new life with wilderness awakening all around us and the mountains are still heavy with snow, making the landscape—and its reflection in the water's glassy surface—extremely photogenic. It's also the time that black and brown bears emerge from hibernation and begin to be seen near the water.

Whenever you choose to come, you'll benefit from our knowledge of the best sites to explore, gained through over 35 years of experience in Alaska, as well as the relationship we've established with the ultimate 'insider,' the Alaska Whale Foundation. There's no better way to experience Alaska and all its wildness than on an authentic expedition.

In addition, you have the freedom to visit the Bridge to watch the captain and officers navigate the thrilling straits, narrows, and bays that make these waters so extraordinary to explore. DISCOVER IT IN THE SPRAY OF A WATERFALL MISTING OVER your expedition landing craft. The sound of a thrashing salmon as a brown bear pulls it from the river. In the concussive wave cast off by a massive piece of ice breaking off a glacier and crashing into the sea. This is where you discover that the wild American frontier is alive and well in the Alaska we explore. We've been sailing our small ships into the coasts' hidden coves and passages for decades—we know where awesome is. It's on the trails carved by generations of bears tromping through the woods; in towns connected by a marine highway rather than a concrete one; in places free from infrastructure and unmarred by humans; places known to few and only accessible to adventurous souls. And now, thanks to our network, including the Alaska Whale Foundation team members who join us aboard our ships, we have an inside track on wildlife movements, which helps us put you into the middle of the action. Join us, and we'll take you right into the heart of wildness where you can make your own personal discoveries.

YOU'RE ON THE FRONTIER. YOU SHOULD HAVE THE FREEDOM TO EXPLORE AS YOU CHOOSE

EACH DAY, WE PROVIDE A FRESH SET OF OPPORTUNITIES, all kinds of choices of what to do in a given location. Hike, paddleboard, kayak, and more. Hang out on deck with binoculars or with your photo instructor. Should you decide to sleep in, have a relaxing breakfast, and get a massage, nobody will look at you funny. You're on vacation. *Your* vacation. Our schedules are flexible and our itineraries are more a function of what's to see than where we need to be. If you like to move, consider our active **Wild Alaska Epic** or **Wild Alaska Escapes** itineraries (pages 22-27), where options for cardio hikes and other activities ashore abound. Conversely, if you like the option to be active on some days, still and observant on others—you can do both. It's your adventure. Our generous staff-to-guest ratio means you can always find a naturalist whose interests and approach you share, whether you want to head off on a trail walk or linger on shore pausing for photos and guidance from your photo instructor. You're free to explore the ship, find your nook or cranny. And you're always welcome to come up to the Bridge and shoot the breeze with the captain and officers.

There is no U in "group."

Okay, maybe there is—but only if you want there to be. Our idea of group travel means never being herded like cattle. Each day, you choose what activities interest you, which members of the expedition team you want to join, and what other guests you want to hang out with. You may all be on the same ship but you aren't in the same boat.

BECAUSE THE UNDERSEA IS VITAL TO YOUR UNDERSTANDING of Alaska, we've committed the technology and personnel resources to offer what no other travel company in Alaska does—an exploration of the vivid and surprising world beneath our ship. During the voyage, an undersea specialist will don special cold-water diving gear—or send an ROV (Remotely Operated Vehicle)—to explore and shoot video of Alaska's surprising marine environment. You'll get to see this amazing world on TV screens in the warm comfort of the lounge, with an undersea specialist as your guide. You'll see the vast kelp forests and discover strange and surprisingly colorful anemones, jellies, rockfish, octopus, and other unusual life forms that are only found deep beneath the surface.

In addition to a fleet of expedition landing craft, kayaks, and stand-up paddleboards, our Alaska ships are outfitted with hydrophones to listen to whales and sea lions underwater, Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROV), and splash-cams for an up-close view of the sea life underneath.
