TASTE THE FAROES WITH CULINARY NATURALIST, FRANCIS LAM Dominated by Atlantic winds, clouds, and tapagraphical

ocean vistas, and topographical grace, the Faroes have become, in the last several years, an unlikely mecca for global gourmets—for the inspired variation on the "New Nordic cuisine" practiced here by the current and former chefs of the restaurant Koks. Johannes Jensen and Leif Sørenson. Francis Lam visited the Faroes on assignment for Bon Appetit in 2014. His article introduced American foodies to this new culinary destination, and made a vivid impression on all of us at Lindblad,

since the Faroes are favorites. Francis joins us in 2017, on both the June and August *Nordic*Passages departures to introduce you to some remarkable individuals, and to a cuisine built on turnips that

taste like cantaloupes, foraging (since there's so little agriculture), and more—plus, incredible seafood, including Faroese langoustines, considered the finest in the world. An exclusive experience, definitely not to be missed.



FRANCIS LAM is the host of public radio's The Splendid Table, editorat-large at Clarkson Potter, and serves on the board of the Southern Foodways Alliance. His writing and editing have won numerous awards from the James Beard Foundation and the International Association of Culinary Professionals. In past lives, he was a columnist for the *New York Times Magazine*, a judge on Top Chef Masters, the features editor at *Gilt Taste*, a senior writer at Salon.com, and a contributing editor at *Gourmet*. His work has appeared in the 2006-2014 editions of *Best Food Writing*. He is also eager to explore and share his knowledge with people willing and ready to taste the world.

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



National Geographic Explorer is a state-of-the-art expedition ship, and the flagship of the Lindblad fleet. It is a fully stabilized, ice-class vessel, with an ice-reinforced hull, enabling it to navigate polar passages while providing exceptional comfort. It carries kayaks and a fleet of Zodiac landing craft. An undersea specialist operates a remotely operated vehicle (ROV) and sophisticated video equipment, extending access to the underwater world.

PUBLIC AREAS: Bistro bar; chart room; restaurant; global gallery; library, lounge with full service bar and state-of-the-art facilities for films, slideshows and presentations; mudroom with lockers for expedition gear, and observation lounge. Our "open bridge" provides guests an opportunity to meet our officers and captain and learn about navigation.

MEALS: Served in single seatings with unassigned tables for an informal atmosphere and easy mingling. Menu is international with local flair.

CABINS: All cabins face outside with windows or portholes, private facilities and climate controls. Some cabins have balconies. Equipped with Ethernet and Wi-Fi connections and USB ports for mobile devices.

EXPEDITION EQUIPMENT: Zodiac landing craft, kayaks, Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV), hydrophone, splashcam, underwater video camera, aerial remote controlled camera, video microscope and snorkeling gear.

SPECIAL FEATURES: A full-time doctor, undersea specialist, Lindblad-National Geographic certified photo instructor and video chronicler, internet café and laundry.

WELLNESS: The vessel is staffed by a wellness specialist and features a glass-enclosed fitness center, outdoor stretching area, two LEXspa treatment rooms and sauna.

CAPACITY: 102 guests in 53 outside cabins. **REGISTRY:** Bahamas. **OVERALL LENGTH:** 338 ft.

The state-of-the-art *National Geographic Orion* is a fully stabilized, ice-class vessel with a reinforced hull. She is spacious and modern, with a variety of public rooms that offer panoramic views of the passing landscape. Friendly and informal, *Orion* fosters a welcoming atmosphere where like-minded guests share in exceptional experiences and enrichment.

PUBLIC AREAS: Outdoor café, lounge with bar, restaurant, sundeck, reception desk, observation lounge and library, global gallery, marina platform, and mudroom. Our "open bridge" allows guests to meet our captain and officers and learn about navigation.

MEALS: All meals are served in a single seating with unassigned tables for an informal atmosphere and easy mingling. The cuisine is international with local flair, featuring tastes of the regions we explore.
